LESSON PLAN

Lesson Title: Poster Design

Grade Level: 7 – 12

Length of Lesson: Four 90-minute Class Periods

Instructional Objectives:

- Students will examine design elements of event posters throughout the 20th century, including Buddy Johnson poster
- Students will conceive and develop a design for a poster advertising a school event.

Vocabulary:

Sketch

Elements of Art: Line, Shape, Color, Value, Texture, Space, Form Principles of Design: Balance, Unity, Variety, Movement, Emphasis, Rhythm, Proportion, Pattern/Repetition

Florence County Museum Connections:

Pee Dee History Gallery: Miller's Grocery

Materials:

Pencil Erasers White Drawing Paper, at least 9 x 12 Colored Pencil Reproductions/Images of event posters throughout the 20th century

Questioning:

- How might a designer best communicate the details of an event while keeping visual unity?
- How can you make a particular detail stand out to the viewer (How do you create emphasis)?
- Do you think the design of a poster can cause a viewer to take action? (i.e. attend an event, purchase tickets, etc...)

Instructional Procedures:

- Students will be given a brief introduction to design and advertising in the 20th century. Students will use the advertisement for the Buddy Johnson Concert as inspiration to create a poster advertising an upcoming school event.
- · The teacher will lead a discussion in ways to visually represent the event while including all necessary information a viewer might need (e.g. time, date, location, cost, etc...).
- · Students will create 4 design ideas (sketches) that would advertise an upcoming school event. After consulting with the teacher, the students will choose one idea to take to completion.
- Students will then draw a detailed advertisement adhering to the Elements of Art and Principles of Design. The Design should include text communicating all important event information. Visual imagery that will attract viewers is also required. This Poster Design should be completed with color, using colored pencil, marker, pastel, or media of teacher's choosing.
- · Consider printing reproductions of each work and having students hang their work throughout the school or community to advertise the upcoming event.

After the United States Army decommissioned the Florence Army Air Field in 1945, the former military base resumed its purpose as the municipal airstrip known as Gilbert Field. For twenty years (1948 - 1968), the old film house on the property previously used for Army recreation and training films became the home of the

In addition to the theatre, another building became a popular local performance venue after the war; the old

Famous local jazz pianist and conductor, Buddy Johnson, and his sister, Ella, were the headlining performers at a concert held there in April, 1951. Buddy Johnson was born Woodrow Wilson Johnson in Darlington, SC in 1915. After graduating from Mayo High School and moving to New York City, he was picked up by Decca Records.

He soon began recording and performing at the Savoy Ball Room and Apollo Theaters in Harlem. Johnson composed many hit songs, including the jazz standards "Since I fell for You" and "Walk 'Em".
